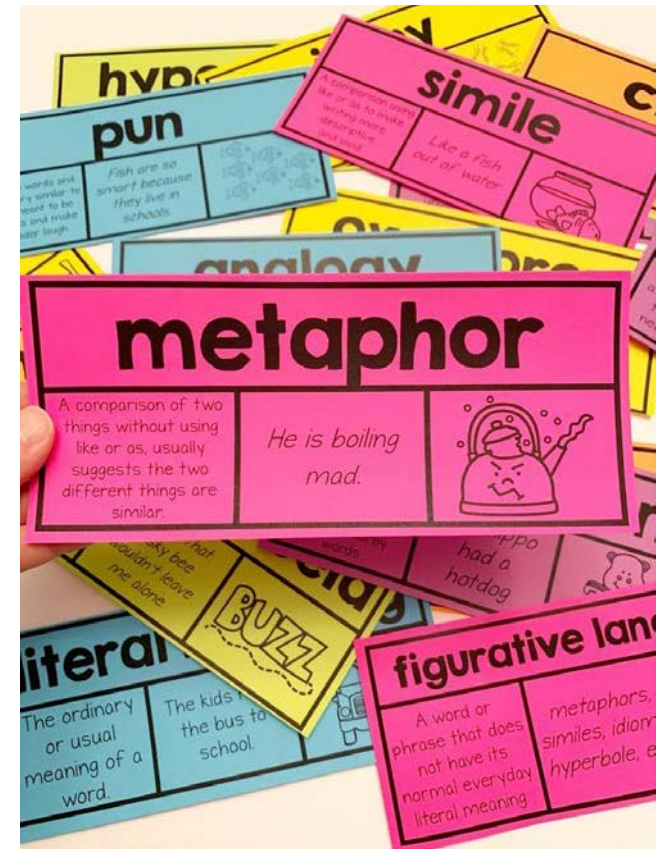
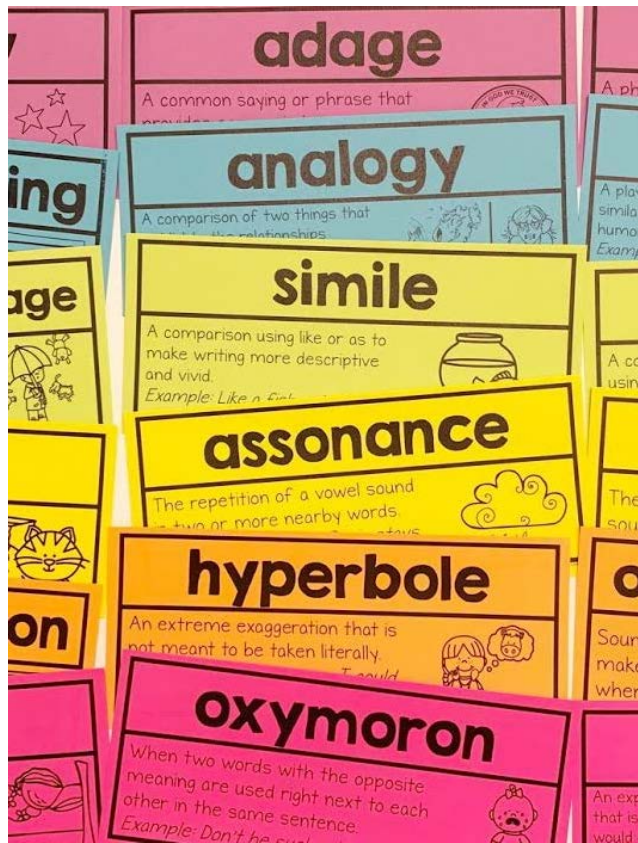

Each word wall card can be printed in two different styles.



Option 1:

Each word wall card includes a title, a definition, example, and an image to help students remember an example of that specific type of figurative language.

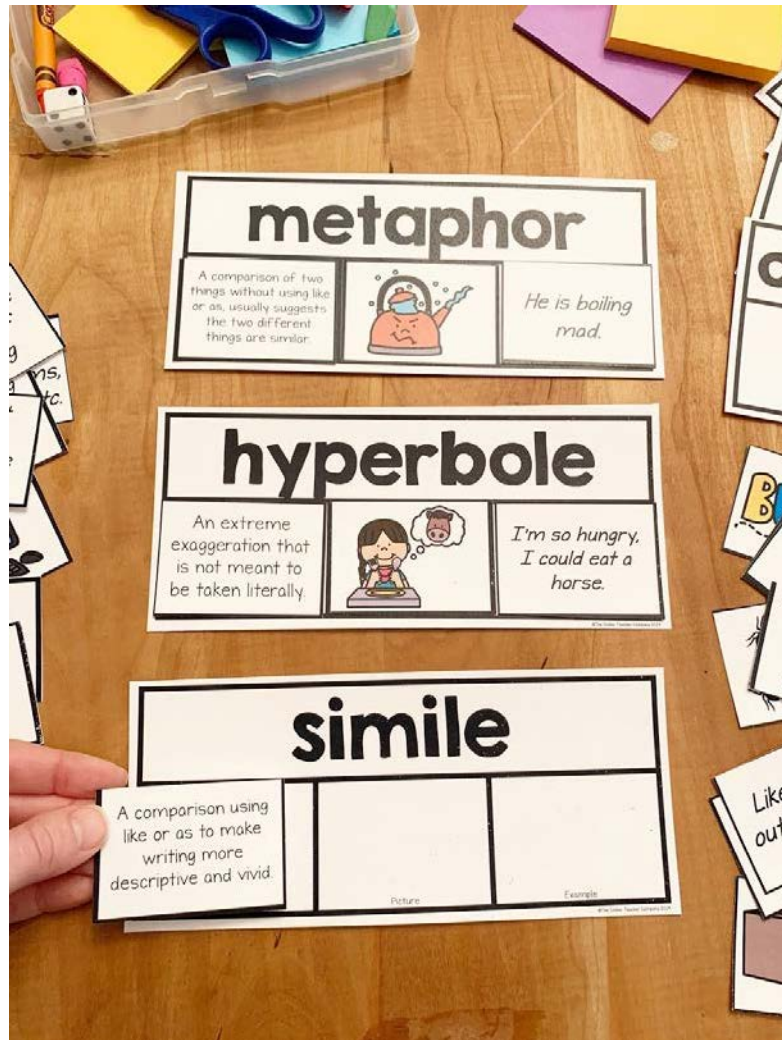
Option 2:









You also have the option of printing the cards so they can become an interactive sorting activity.


