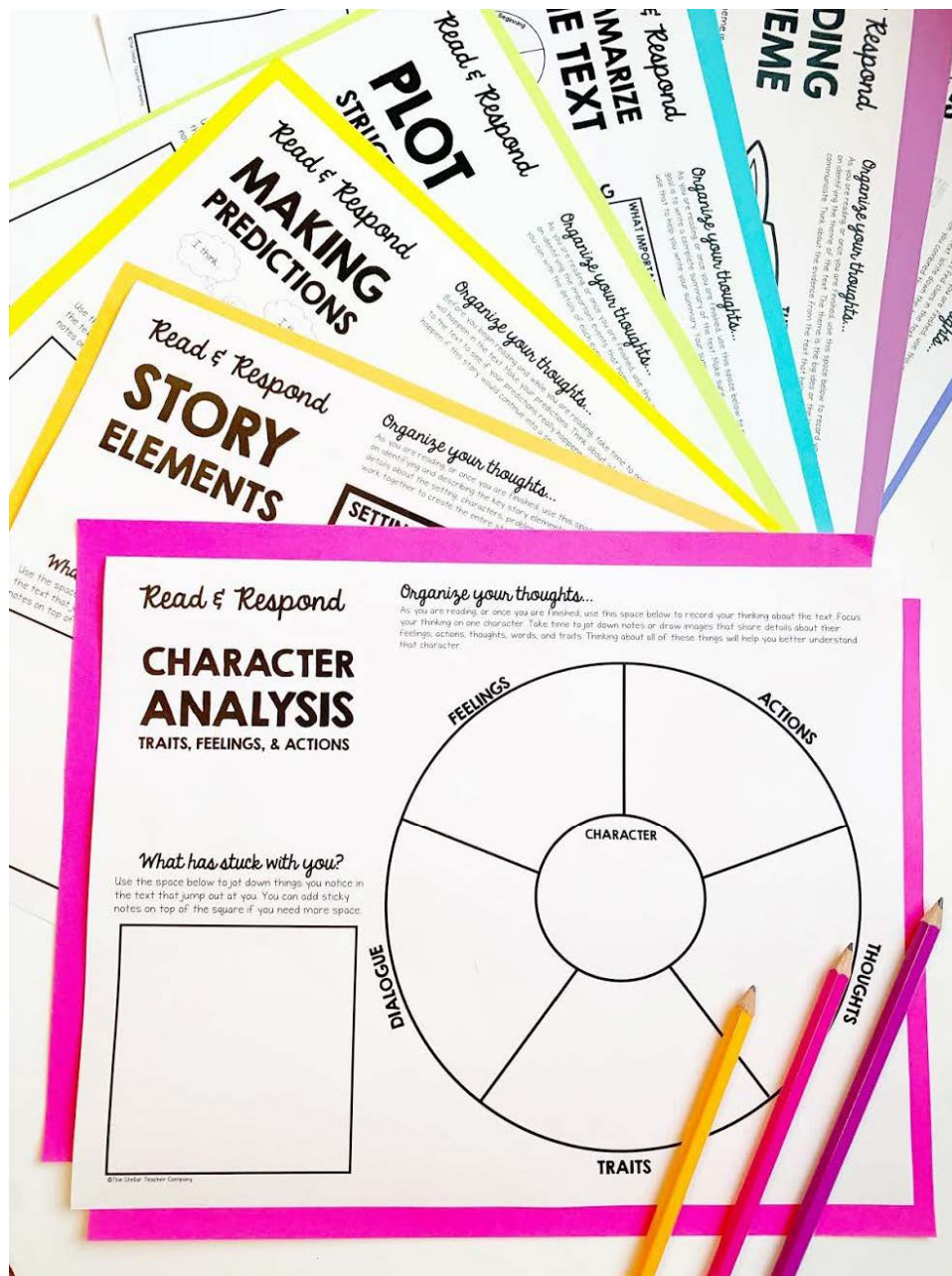

This is an important lesson to learn. People can sometimes feel like they are upstaged by friends, but we need to remember that our friends actually make us better.

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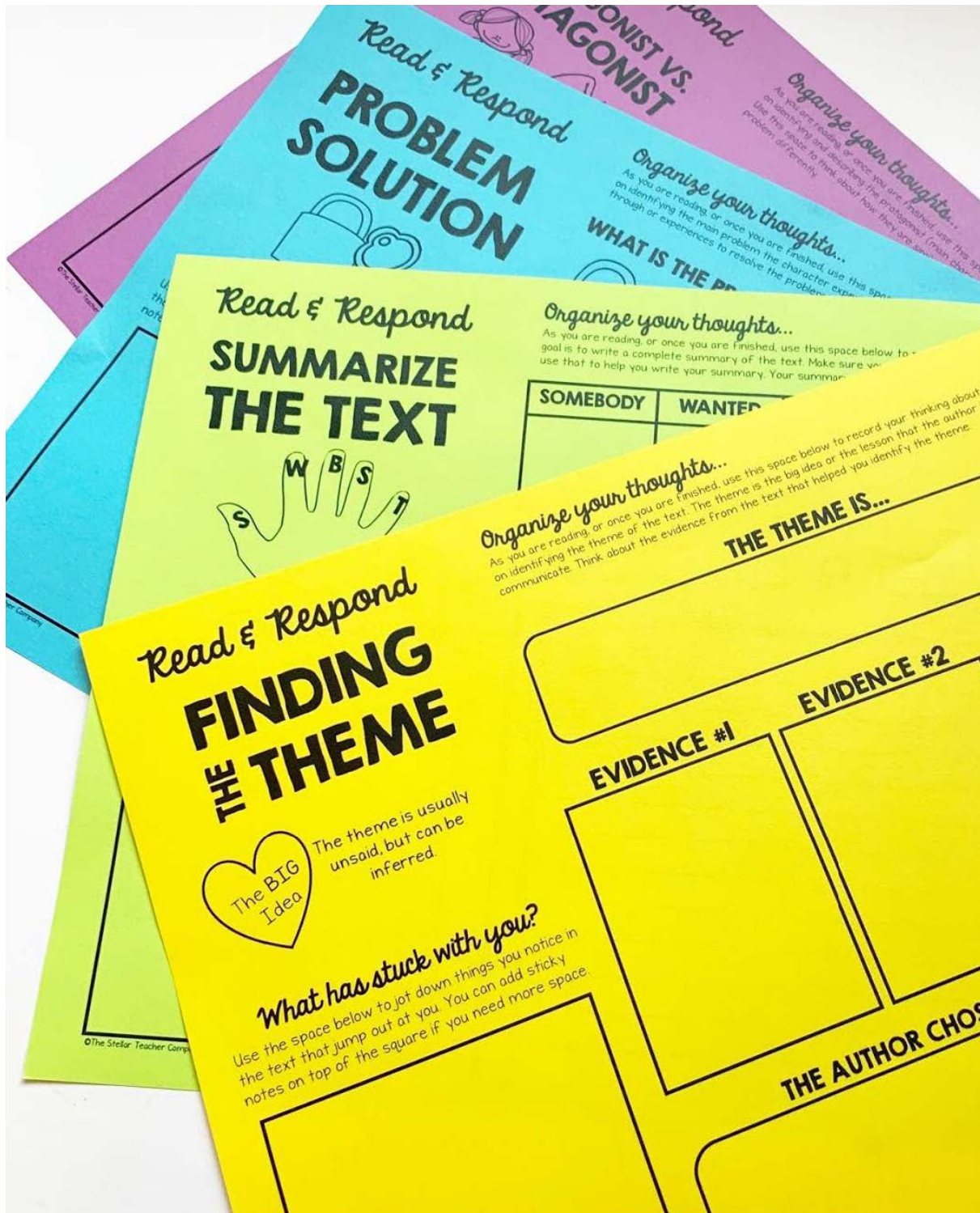


Organize your thoughts...




