# WINTER THEMED READING PASSAGES



The stars are full of information! Humans have studied the stars and planets for many years. We even use events happening in the sky to mark time, like seasons. The winter solstice is an astronomical event marking the first day of winter.

For people living in the Northern Hemisphere – areas above the Equator – the winter solstice occurs on December 21st or 22nd. What happens on the winter solstice? It marks the moment when half of Earth is titled farthest away from the sun. This angle results in less sunlight reaching Earth, therefore, we refer to it as the shortest day of the year. Every day following the winter solstice begins to get longer – meaning we have daylight longer. Anybody living below the Equator experiences winter solstice in June!

#### A SEASON OR A SOLSTICE?

The winter solstice is the astronomical first day of winter. Astronomical means relating to astronomy. But there is also a meteorological first day of the **winter season**. Meteorological means relating to the branch of science associated with the processes of the atmosphere, like weather!

These days are different. Winter solstice is marked by the tilt of the Earth and happens every year in December. Meteorologists determine the first day of **winter season** based on temperature records. A meteorologist studies the weather and climate. Weather temperatures and patterns mark a season. In the United States, most areas refer to winter from the months of December to March.

A myth associated with the winter solstice is that it is the coldest day of the year. Although it could be possible for the record cold temperatures to occur in December, overall, January tends to have the coldest temperatures in the Northern Hemisphere. SEEING A SOLISTICE...

Much like we see a change in seasons, there is a way to see the winter solstice. Sort of. If you were to stand outside at noon on the day of the winter solstice, your shadow would appear longer than usual. Why?

Well, let's break it down. Every day the sun rises in the east and sets in the west. The sun follows an imaginary arc through the sky. The height of the arc changes throughout the Earth's orbit around the sun.

Also, as the Earth orbits, it's tilt changes. In winter in the Northern Hemisphere, the Earth's North Pole is tilted away from the sun making the height of the arc low. This results in a shadow that looks longer than other times of the year!


In Latin, the word solstice translates to "sun stands still." During the winter solstice, the sun is so low it looks as if it is rising and setting in the same place – as if it is *standing still*  Includes 6 fun and engaging reading passages & a variety of reading response activities!





### The Abominable Snowman

Sightings of a tall, hairy, apelike creature walking the snowy peaks of the Himalayas can be dated as for back as 1832. The Aborninable Snowman, or commonly referred to as Yeti, is a mythical monster living in the depths of the Himalayan mountains. This legendary creature is most often described and depicted as a large white, apelike creature sometimes with sharp teeth.

Mysterious footprints in the snow - of areas around the world - have been reported since the early 19<sup>th</sup> century. In the early 1800s, explorers navigating the snowy peaks of the Himalayas started reporting footprints allegedly belonging to Yeti. BH Hodgson, a naturalist and ethnologist working in India and Nepal, wrote about possible Yeti encounters in 1832. Local guides shared reported encounters with a tall creature walking on two legs to Hodgson. Locals believed this creature was that of the mythical creature, Yeti. Upon further investigation, Hodgson had

reason to believe the sightings were actually that of an orangutan. But these were only the start of many reported sightings and encouters with the mysterious monster in the mountains. Word of the Aborninable Snowman traveled quickly, specifically increasing the number of visitors attempting to scale the mountains of Nepal in search of the legendary creature. Most sightings describe an apelike creature to be 15+ feet tall and covered in hail Some sightings describe snowy white hair while others report darker hair colors.

In 1915, a mountaineer climbing Mount Everest, shared photographs of larg footprints in the snow allegedly belonging to the Abominable Snowman. The photographs have faced much scrutiny. No solid evidence was ever found.

Reported sightings increased through the 1950s and well into the 1960s. But eventually interest in finding the legendary creature decreased. Most footprints and sightings have been made out to be that of bears or other native animals living in the areas where footprints or sightings are reported. Even with no reliable evidence of the Yett's existence, reports of sightings still occur.

In fact, in 2011 a supposed capturing of the creature was reported in Russia. A hunter reported seeing a bear-like creature attacking his sheep. After firing a shot at the creature, it ran away into the forest on two legs. The story went on to claim Russian border patrol capture the hairy two-legged creature. The story was later revealed to be a hoax.

The Abominable Snowman has made many appearances in pop culture. The creature has been depicted in films, literature, documentaries, and even video games. A Yeti-like monster even made an appearance in the popular Disney move *Mansters Inc*.
