
Picture of the Day



Reading Passages & Comprehension Questions


Each Passage & Response Questions Follow A 4 Step Process

Step 1: Read The Passage: Students read the short passage.


Step 2: Think About The Passage: Students can use sticky notes or the blank squares to jot down their thoughts or questions about the text.

Step 3: Organize Your Thinking: Students organize their thinking by using the graphic organizer template.

Step 4: **Respond To The Text**: Students can answer 3 comprehension questions about the text.

There are two roll—n respond boards. Each one includes 6 different prompts that help students respond to a text they are reading.


Question Stems

Includes templates for question cubes and a cootie catcher/fortune teller. This is an easy way to make reading handson.









😂 Read the Text

Nocturnal Eyes

Nocturnal creatures have developed many adaptations that help them live successfully while the rest of the world is sleeping. Some of these adaptations are the mechanisms of the eye designed to "see in the dark."

Nocturnal eyes, like the one shown below, have special structures at the back of the eye to maximize their ability to see in low light. Rod-shaped cells in the retina absorb and store extra light in low light situations.



A membrane called the tapetum behind the retina re-reflects light back on to the retina a second time. These adaptatians make the eyes of nacturnal animals very sensitive to light. Slit-shaped pupils can rapidly narrow to protect the sensitive internal eye parts from too much light.

Basketball Basketball began in Massachusetts, where sports couldn't really be played outdoors in the harsh winters. James Naismith was a physical education teacher from Massachusetts. He searched for ways to manage classes during the winter and on rainy days. He wanted an indoor athletic alternative, so he got creative. Naismith published 13 rules of basketball on December 21, 1891, in Massachusetts. Some wanted to call the sport Naismith Ball. However, he called it basketball because there is a basket and a ball.

In the beginning, peach baskets were used to catch the ball. Players needed to use a ladder to retrieve the ball. Soccer balls were used, not the orange basketballs you see today. Later, a backboard was added to prevent the audience in the balcomy from interfering.

Professional basketball teams were formed in the 1920s. The Basketball Association of America (BAA) was created in 1946. The First game was played on November 1, 1946. By 1949, the National Basketball Association (NBA) was formed. This merged the BAA with the National Basketball League (NBL).
