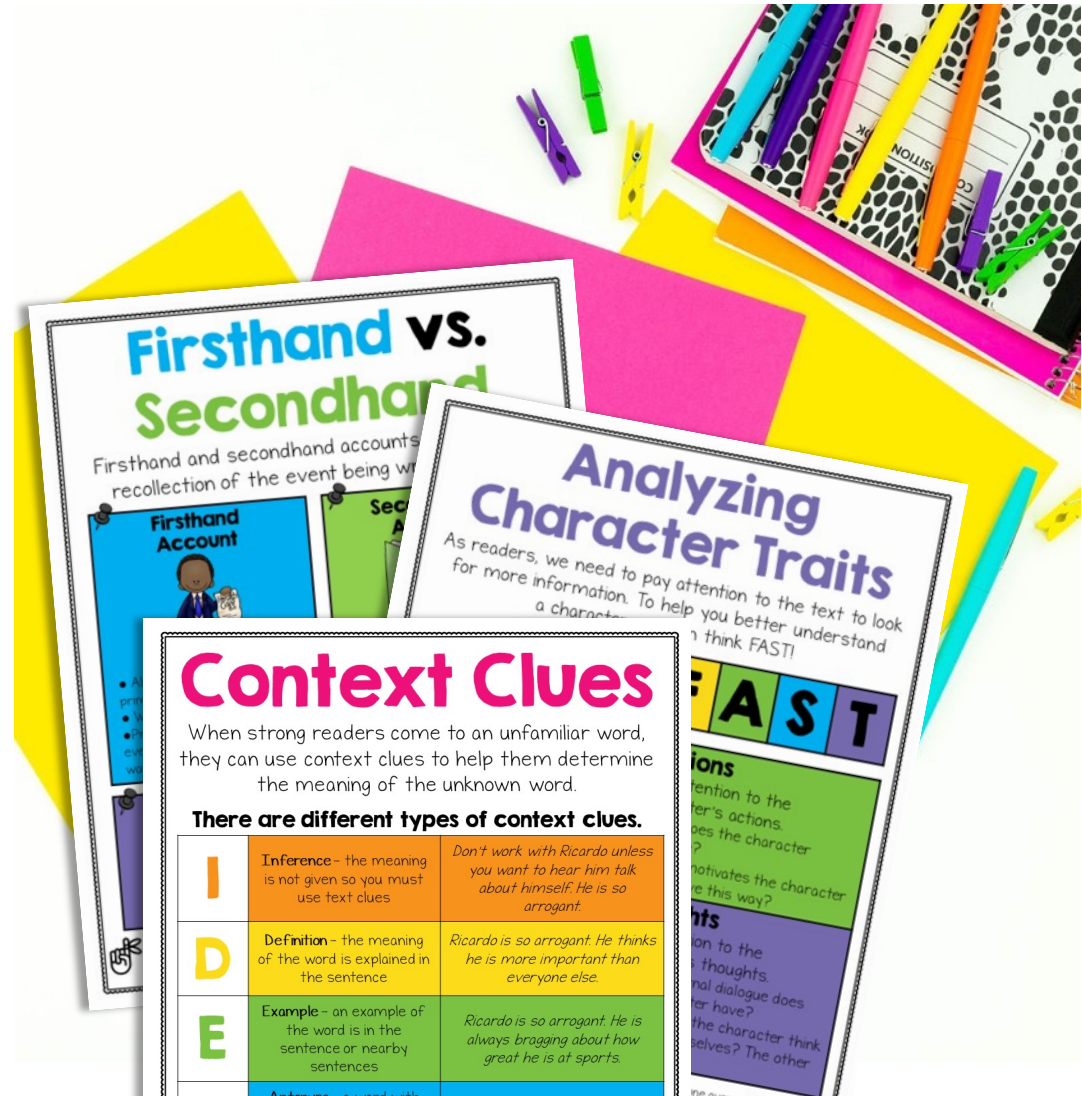

## Analyzing Character Traits

As readers, we need to pay attention to the text to look for more information. To help you better understand a character, think FAST!

**F** **A** **S** **T**

**F** Focus on the character's actions. Does the character motivate the character in this way?

**A** Ask questions about the character's thoughts. What does the character's dialogue tell us about the character? The other...

## Context Clues

When strong readers come to an unfamiliar word, they can use context clues to help them determine the meaning of the unknown word.

There are different types of context clues.

<b>I</b>	<b>Inference</b> - the meaning is not given so you must use text clues	<i>Don't work with Ricardo unless you want to hear him talk about himself. He is so arrogant.</i>
<b>D</b>	<b>Definition</b> - the meaning of the word is explained in the sentence	<i>Ricardo is so arrogant. He thinks he is more important than everyone else.</i>
<b>E</b>	<b>Example</b> - an example of the word is in the sentence or nearby sentences	<i>Ricardo is so arrogant. He is always bragging about how great he is at sports.</i>

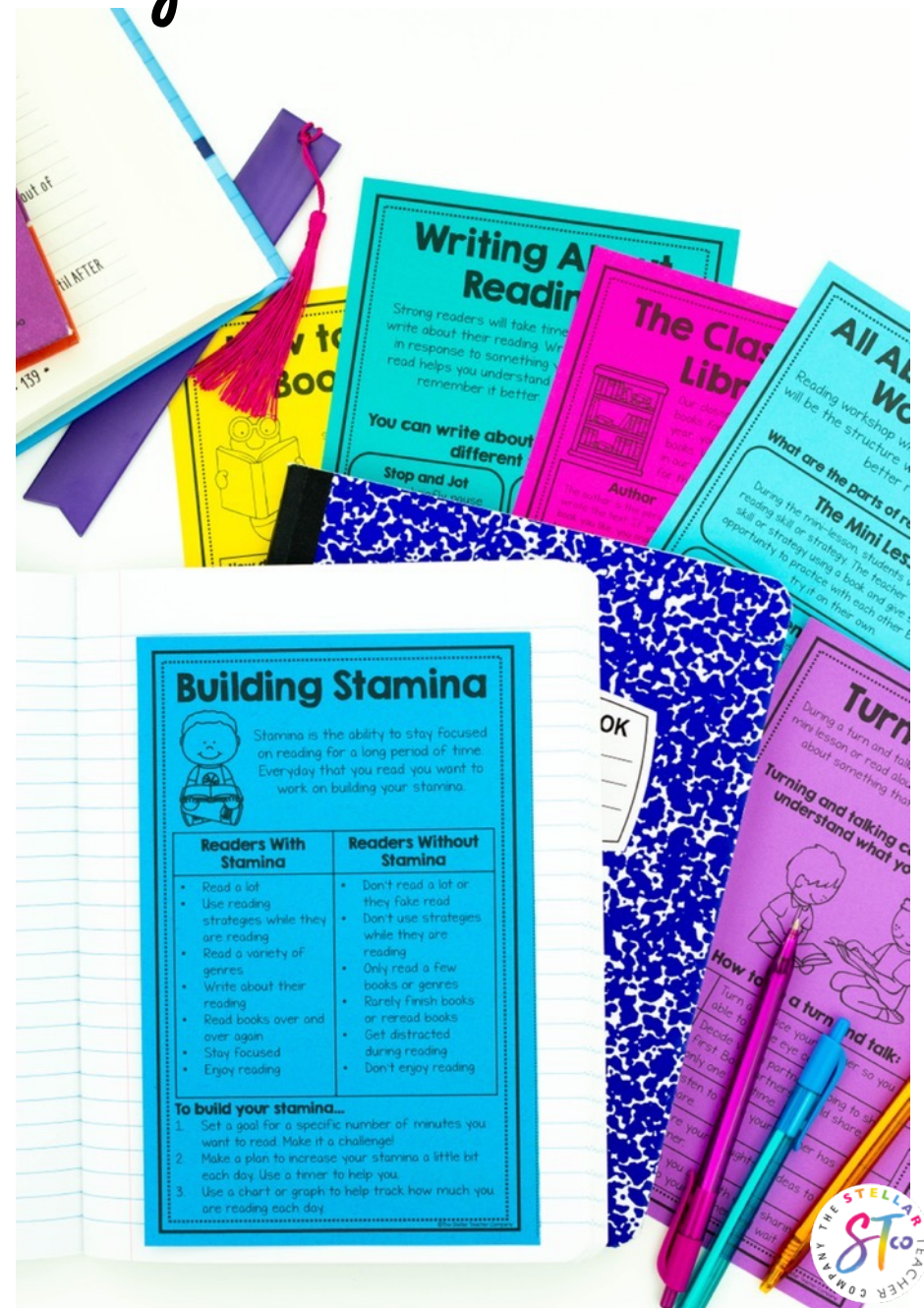

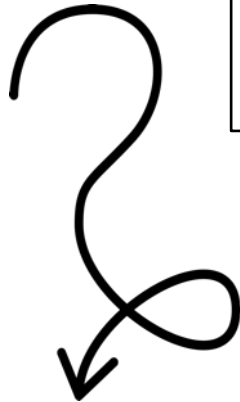
# 3 DIFFERENT PRINTING OPTIONS:

## Option 1:

Print in black and white to save ink. Looks great when printed on Astrobrights!



### Figurative Language

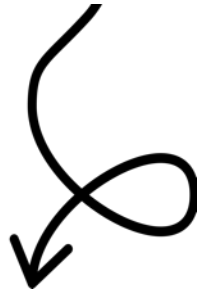
Figurative language is when the words go beyond their literal meaning. Authors use figurative language to communicate ideas in a fun way.

**Common examples of figurative language:**

<p><b>Simile</b> A simile is a comparison that uses like or as. <i>She is as busy as a bee.</i></p>	<p><b>Metaphor</b> A metaphor directly compares two things. <i>He's boiling mad.</i></p>
<p><b>Idiom</b> A common expression that means something other than what the words say. <i>When pigs fly</i></p>	<p><b>Personification</b> Giving human characteristics to non-human things. <i>My heart raced</i></p>
<p><b>Onomatopoeia</b> A sound word that makes its sound when you read it. <b>ZAP</b></p>	<p><b>Hyperbole</b> An expression that is an exaggeration. <i>He cried a river.</i></p>

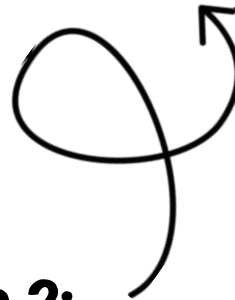
## Option 3:
