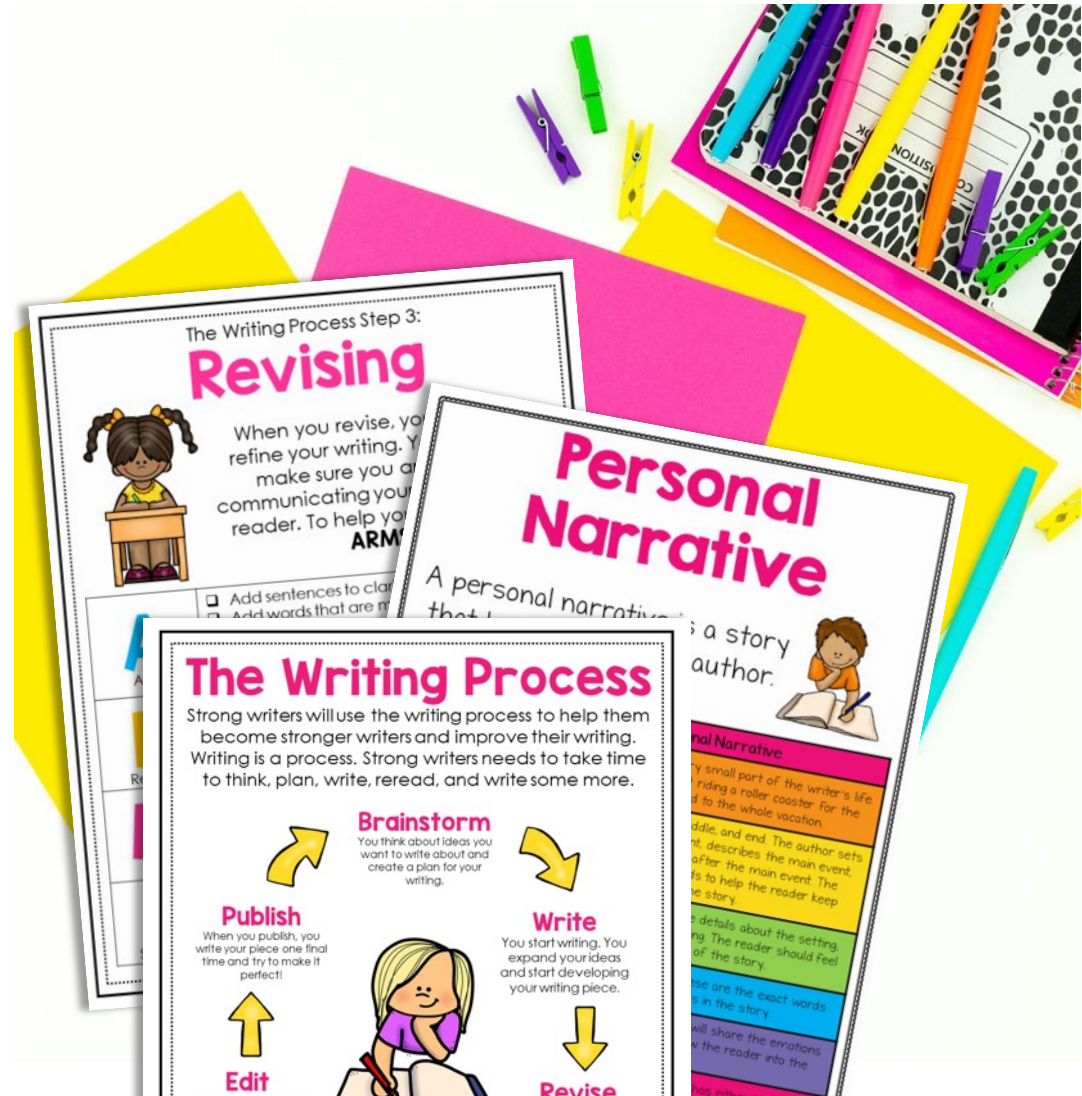

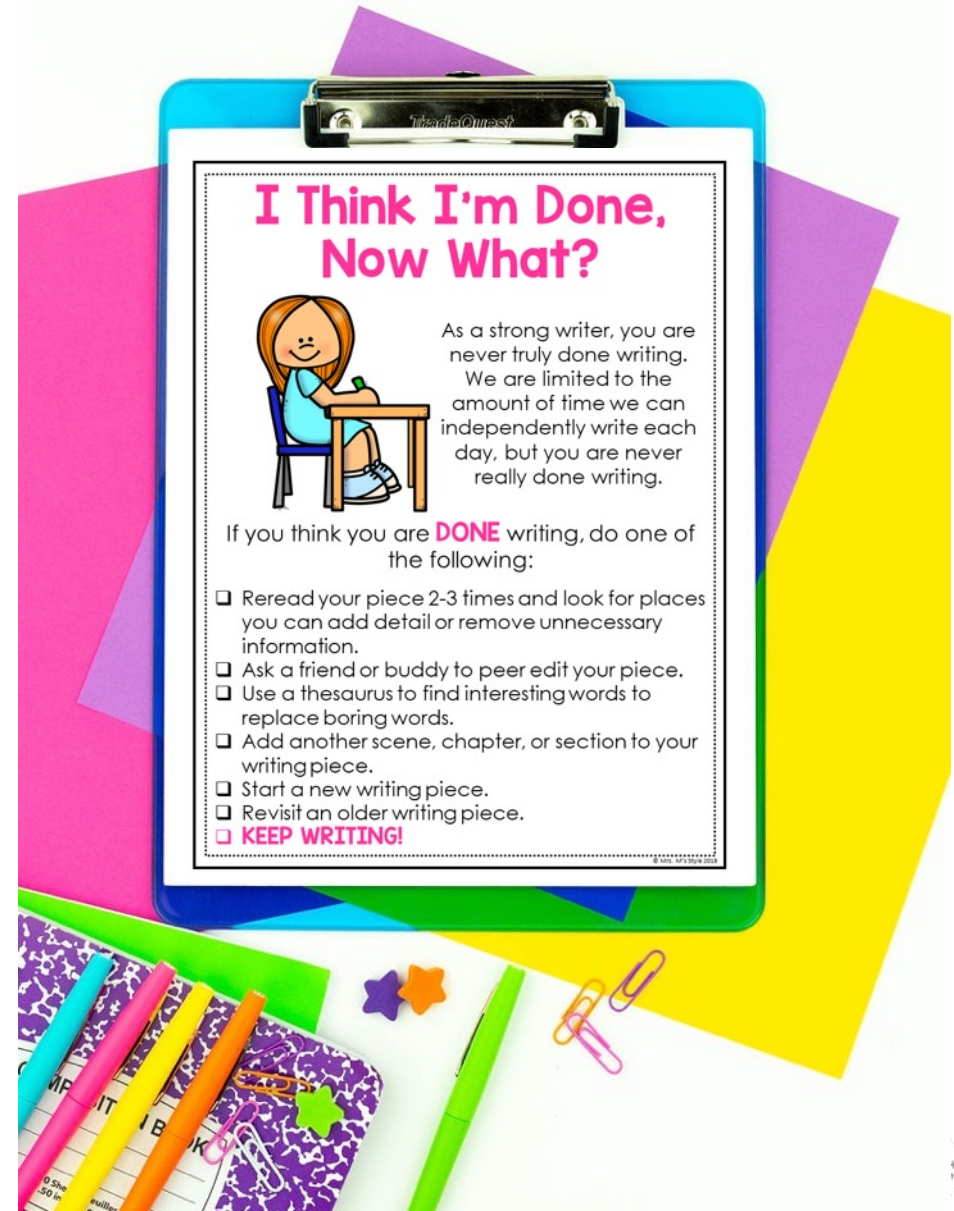

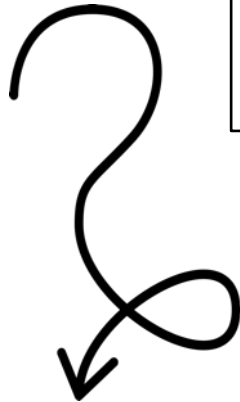

Option 1:

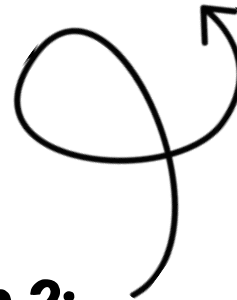
Print in black and white to save ink. Looks great when printed on Astrobrights!

Strong Emotions	Throughout the story, the author will share the emotions they were feeling. This helps draw the reader into the story.
Meaningful Ending	At the end of the story, the author has either learned an important lesson or has changed in a meaningful way.

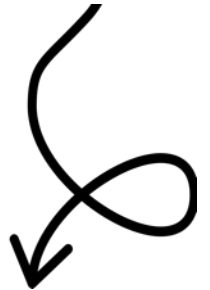


Option 2:

Said is Dead! Use more exciting words instead! Word choice is extremely important when you are writing.



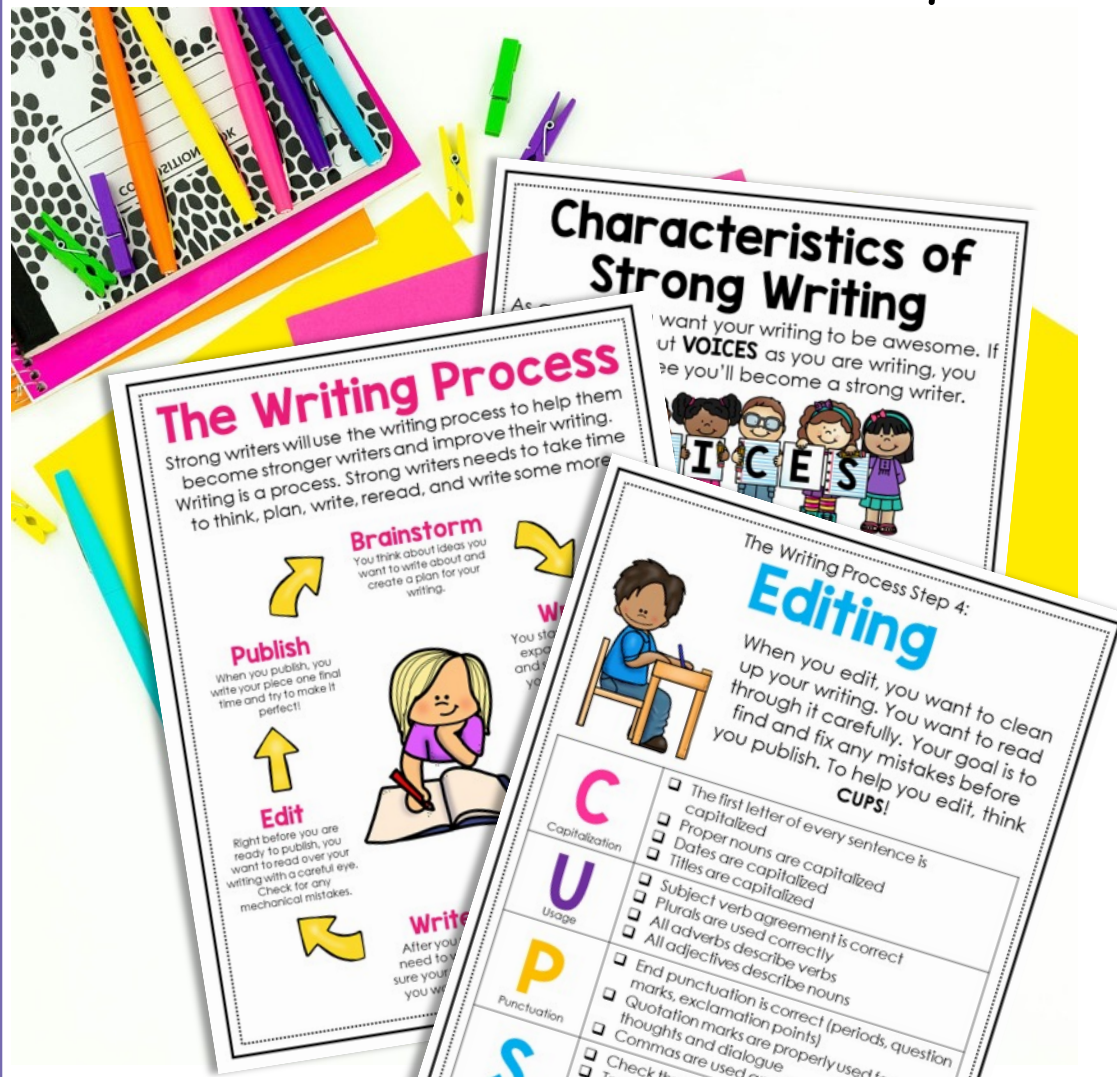

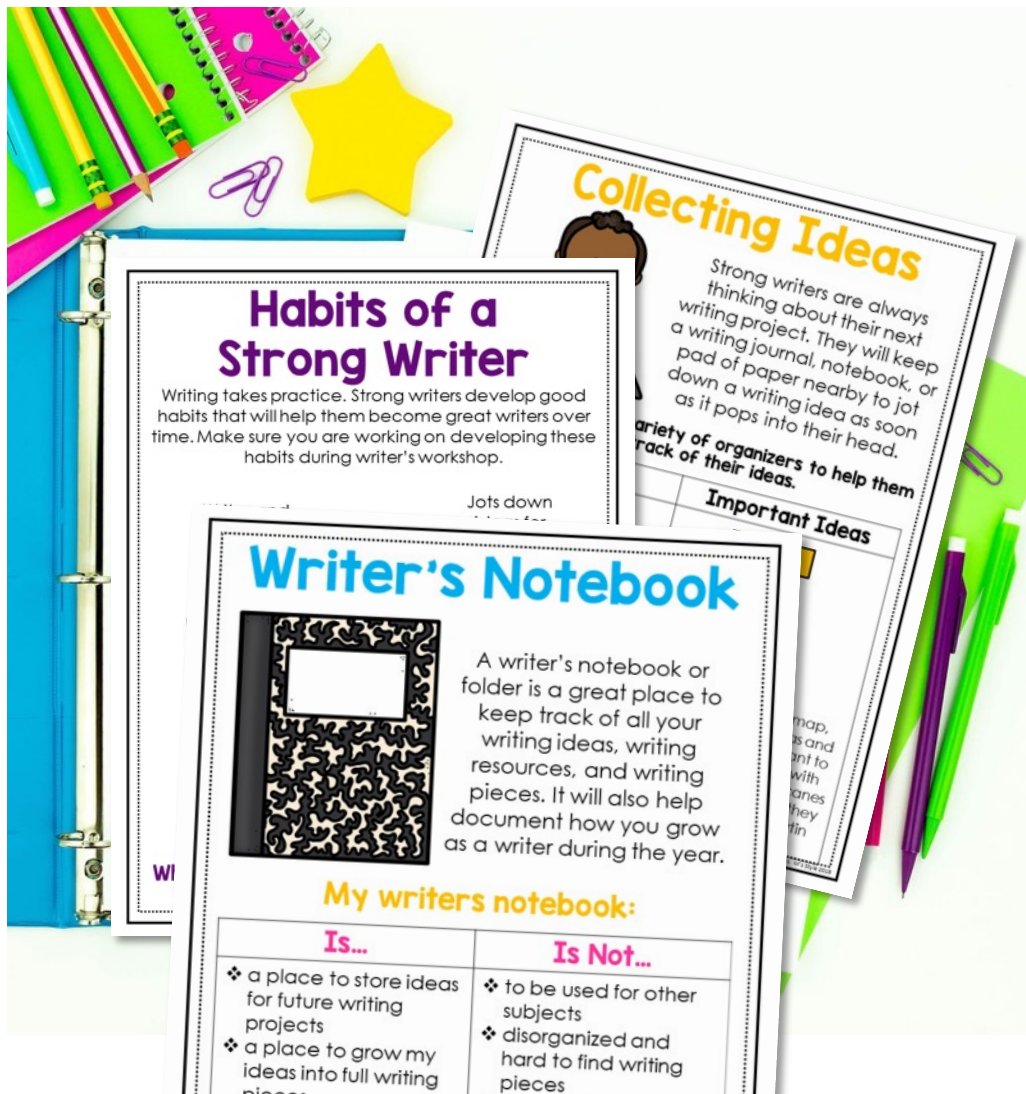

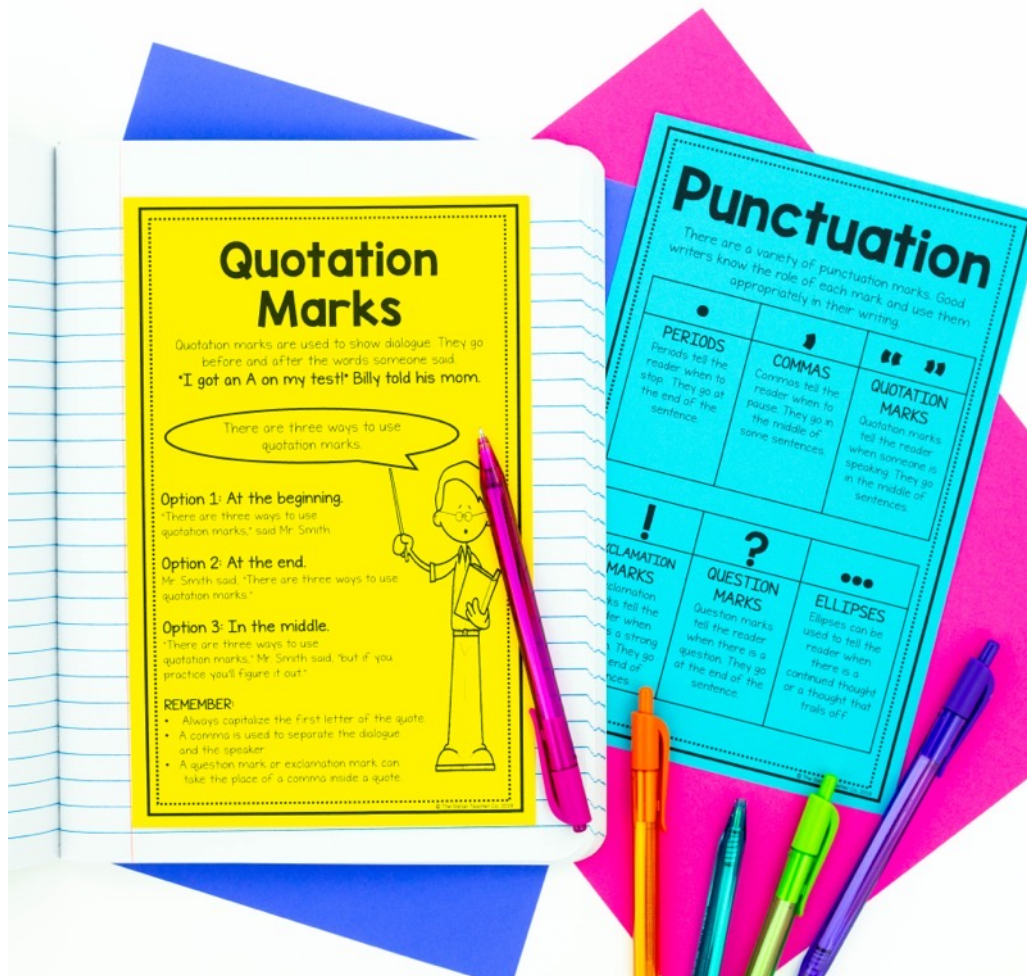
