Adding Dialogue

Helpful Hints:

- Dialogue occurs between two characters and it can help the reader better understand the story.
- Dialogue can add details and let you know more about certain characters.
- When you are writing dialogue you want to think about the emotions or feelings that are being expressed.

Show Not Tell - Feelings

Helpful Hints:

- Strong writers will try to SHOW their readers how a character feels rather than just stating them.
- When you SHOW and not just tell, you create a more vivid experience for the reader.
- Your readers will be able to relate to the feelings in the story when you show and not just tell.

Personal Narrative

A personal narrative is a story that happened to the author.



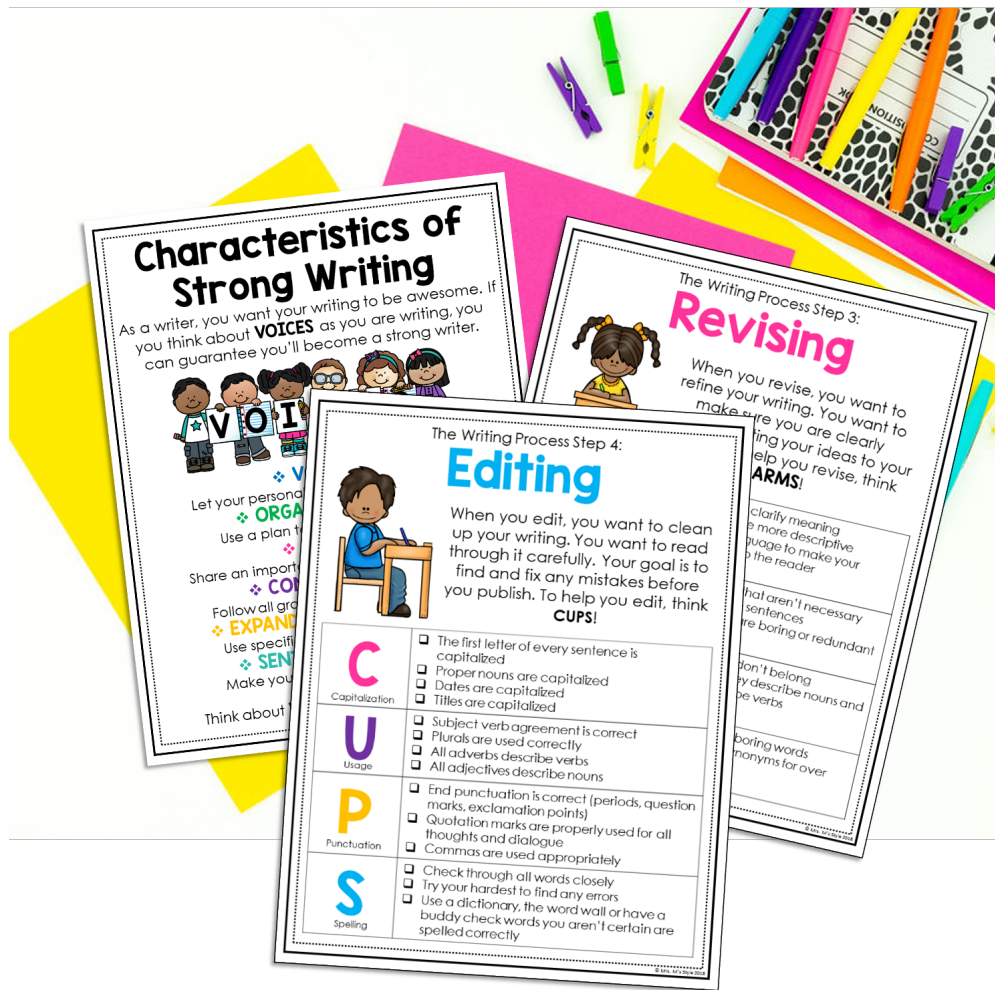
Characteristics of a Personal Narrative

Small Moment	The story focuses on a very small part of the writer's life. The story might be about riding a roller coaster for the first time compared to the whole vacation.
Beginning, Middle, End	There is a clear beginning, middle, and end. The author sets the stage for the main event, describes the main event, describes what happened after the main event. The author uses transition words to help the reader keep track of the story.
Includes Vivid Details	The author includes descriptive details about the setting, characters, and events happening. The reader should feel like they are a part of the story.
Dialogue	The author includes dialogue. These are the exact words said between characters in the story.
Strong Emotions	Throughout the story, the author will share the emotions they were feeling. This helps draw the reader into the story.
Meaningful Ending	At the end of the story, the author has either learned an important lesson or has changed in a meaningful way.

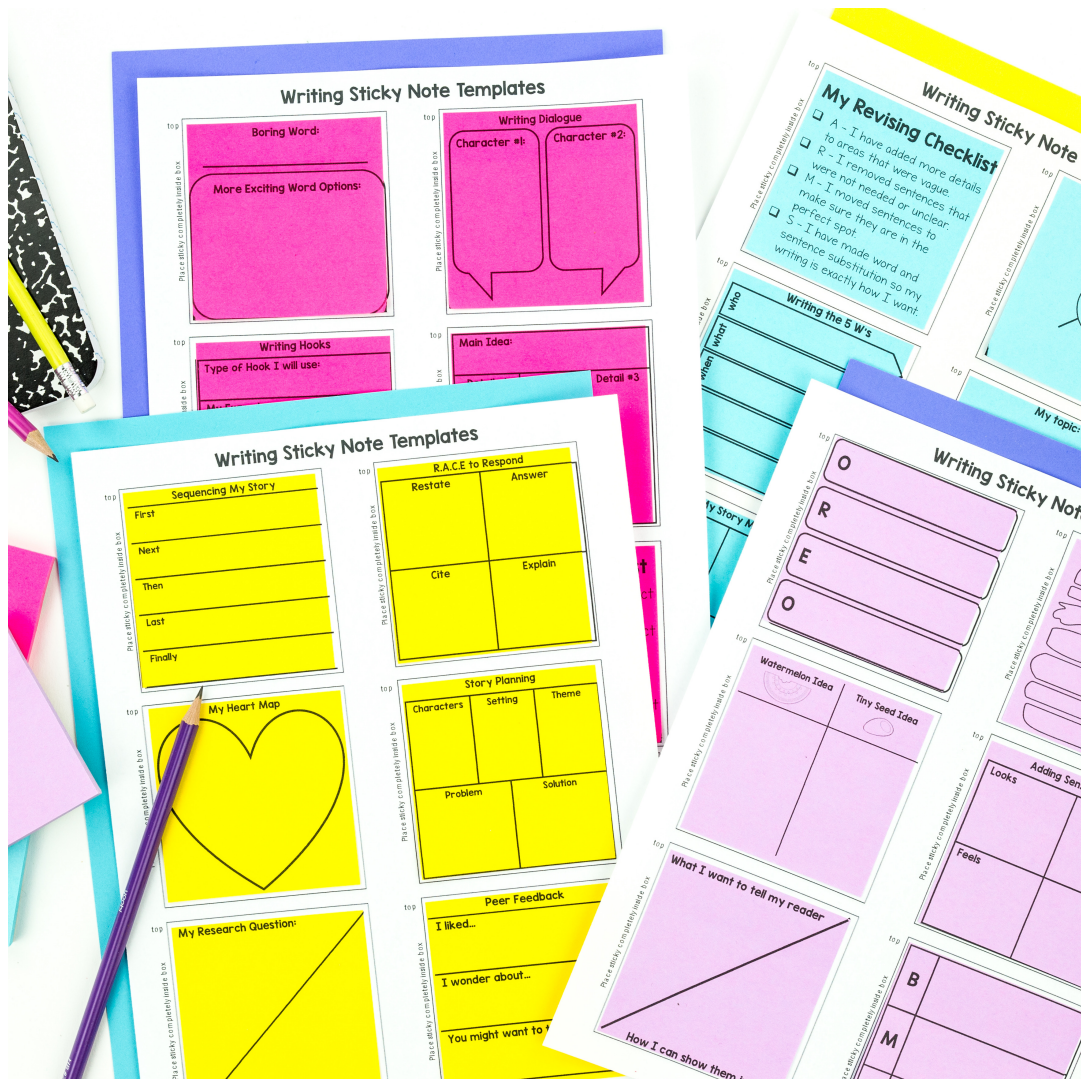

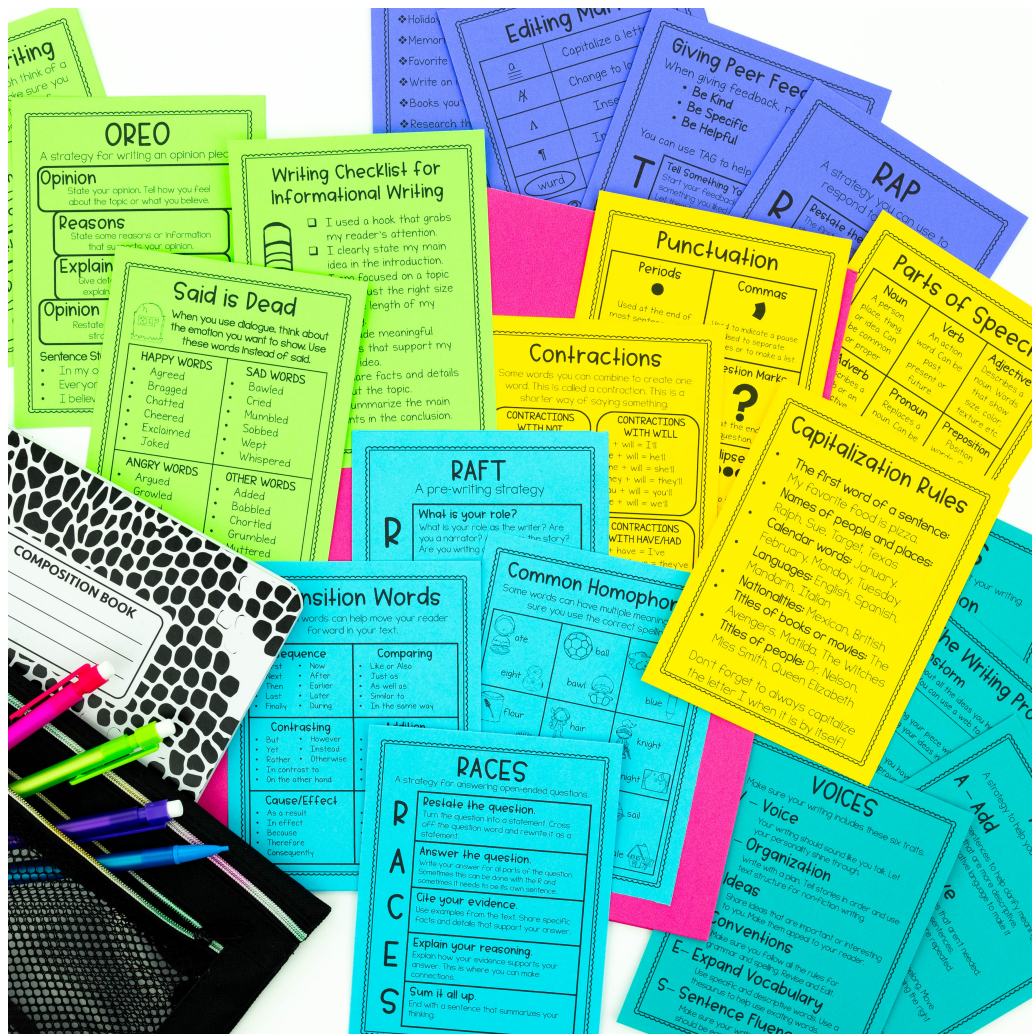
